'We're thrilled to be listed on the Toronto Stock Exchange'

Leisureworld, TMX Group open the market

Leisureworld Senior Care Corporation staff joined executives from the TMX Group to officially open the market during a ceremony at the TMX Broadcast Centre in Toronto Friday morning.

Leisureworld, which owns 26 long-term care homes, a retirement home, and an independent living home for seniors in Ontario, trades on the Toronto Stock Exchange (TSX) under the stock symbol LW.

"All of us at Leisureworld Senior Care Corporation are excited about our new status as a publicly-traded company and we're thrilled to be listed on the Toronto Stock Exchange," said David Cutler, Leisureworld CEO.

"This listing is a great milestone for our company." Cutler continued to thank the people and organizations that made the achievement possible, including the TMX Group. "We recognize your growth and importance as the world's seventh largest exchange and we appreciate the value proposition you offer to medium-sized companies like ours."

Leisureworld has completed its Initial Public Offering with 19,020,000 common shares. The shares were sold to investors at \$10 per share, generating total gross proceeds of about \$190 million. Leisureworld's common shares began trading on the TSX as of March 23.

"This event today reminds us that this is the beginning of our journey, not the completion," Cutler said. "All of us on the Leisureworld management team are committed to delivering long-term shareholder value...and we're committed to a vigorous investor relations program, one that ensures the financial community hears and appreciates our investment proposition."

TMX Group CEO Tom Kloet proposed the celebratory toast.

"We're delighted to have you here today," Kloet said.

"The demographics are clearly interesting for Leisureworld. I think you have an outstanding future."
